From the Pastor's Pen

Summer if officially upon us. Soon we will be celebrating our nation's birth with picnics, fireworks, parades and more on July 4th. Here at Redeemer, we'll be having our church picnic on July 13th. As summer moves into full swing, and as we pause to celebrate the holiday known as Independence Day, just what is our role as Christians within our country?

While one might go to any number of books, websites or social media posts to do so, I suggest we go to a resource that every one of you should have: Luther's Small Catechism. The catechism speaks to the role of the Christian in their country? Yes! It's found in that little known part called the "Table of Duties." In this Table, we see concrete expressions of our duty to "thank and praise, serve and obey" our heavenly Father (as the First Article of the Creed concludes). As Christians, we live in three "estates" which are: Family, Civic, and Church. It is the Civic estate that we are considering.

As soon as you were born in this country, you became a citizen. As citizens, we have governmental rights and privileges. We also have obligations. As citizens, we live under authority. All people, in all nations, live under some sort of authority. All authority is from God, and those in government authority are placed there as God's servants (Roman 13:1-4). Scripture tells us that as citizens under governmental authority, we owe our government taxes and respect. "Give to Caesar what is Caesar's, and to God what is God's" (Matthew 22:21). "Therefore one must be in subjection, not only to avoid God's wrath but also for the sake of conscience. For because of this you also pay taxes, for the authorities are ministers of God, attending to this very thing. Pay to all what is owed to them: taxes to whom taxes are owed, revenue to whom revenue is owed, respect to whom respect is owed, honor to whom honor is owed" (Romans 13:5-7).

As citizens in our country, we have the right and privilege to participate in government. Whether that is simply voting (which many people in many places don't get to do), or running for some public office, we are blessed to be able to participate in actions/activities that are for the benefit of our neighbors. And that, dear Christian, is key for us to remember. Our chief role/responsibility/aim in our participation in the Civic realm is not for ourselves, but for the benefit of our neighbor.

Luther, in his "On the Freedom of a Christian" wrote: "We conclude, therefore, that a Christian lives not in himself, but in Christ and in his neighbor. Otherwise he is not a Christian. He lives in Christ through faith, in his neighbor through love. By faith he is caught up beyond himself into God. By love he descends beneath himself into his neighbor."³

While we have rights and privileges as citizens, we also have Christian obligations to our government. Chief among them is prayer. 1 Timothy 2:1-3 says, "First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way. This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior" Imagine that! Paul, who would soon be executed (possibly by Nero) urged Christians to pray for their ruling authorities. Why? So that they would be able to lead a quiet and peaceful life.

Paul, and Peter, also urged Christians to lives of submissive obedience to their leaders (Titus 3:1; 1 Peter 2:13-14).

We have much to be thankful for living in our country. We have blessings that others, in other countries, do not have. Yet we need to remember that "this world is not our home." We are citizens of a better country. Hebrews 11:13-16 reminds us: "These all died in faith, not having received the things promised, but having seen them and greeted them from afar, and having acknowledged that they were strangers and exiles on the earth. For people who speak thus make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of that land from which they had gone out, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God, for he has prepared for them a city."

God has done all that for us through the life, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus. While we get to, through our roles and responsibilities as citizens, do what we can to make our city, state, and/or country a better place to live; God was "in Christ reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation" (2 Corinthians 5:19). We get to take that message of reconciliation to our neighbors. May we do so, not just in word, but in loving service to those neighbors.

Have a happy and safe 4th of July, and see you in church...



Faithfulness: The Stewardship Standard

"Moreover, it is required of stewards that they be found faithful" (1 Cor. 4:2).

What is the standard to which a steward is held? Ask the average person, and they might talk about percentages, tithes, and commitments. Too often, the default mode of measuring stewards is by how much and how frequently they give. This is not helpful. Measuring activity without any connection to baptismal identity is a recipe for disaster. It can either breed a sense of superiority and self-righteousness or create a culture of scarcity and despair. Neither outcome is godly or helpful.

This is not to say that stewardship should be regarded as "no big deal." St. Paul, within his discussion of the ministry to which he has been called, sets the standard of accountability for the steward: faithfulness. This removes any sense of superiority or self-righteousness and dispels scarcity and despair. When a steward manages what the Lord has entrusted to them — resources and all aspects of life — for God's purposes, the focus is not on how much or how frequently they give.

This standard reflects the stewardship portrayed in the Gospels where Jesus entrusts varying amounts, each according to ability. The commended stewards were recognized for their faithfulness in their vocation, not the amounts they managed. Conversely, the condemned stewards were not castigated for their lack of performance but for their lack of faithfulness.

What does this mean for the steward in the pew? The Lord has entrusted you with various things. Luther captures them in his explanation of the First Article of the Apostles' Creed and the Fourth Petition of the Lord's Prayer. The familiar couplets of food and drink, house and home, spouse and children, land, animals and all possessions are the Lord's, and He has entrusted them to you for His purpose. This trust brings an active realization of thanksgiving.

This active thanksgiving is our stewardship. It can be distilled into two questions that the steward regularly needs to answer:

1. How has God blessed me?

2. How is He calling me to respond?

The first question is quite simple to answer: if the Lord has entrusted something to you, it is a blessing. This blessing is for God's glory and the benefit of your neighbor. The second question is more challenging to measure; it is not about percentages and charts. Instead, it is about a life of thanksgiving that flows from the mercies of God revealed in Jesus Christ. This thanksgiving starts at and flows from the cross and the empty tomb. Our stewardship of the Gospel drives our stewardship of everything else.

The standard, then, is faithfulness. Faithfulness flows from eyes focused on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith. It does not come from our efforts but through the working of the Holy Spirit in our lives, through Word and Sacrament. It begins at the altar in the Divine Service but extends into the world — from hearth and home to workplace and classroom, from commerce to leisure. The mercy of God, freely given in Jesus, leads us to demonstrate a faithfulness that reveals to others the same mercy we have received in Jesus.

This faithfulness cannot be measured empirically. It is simply allowing the Holy Spirit to work in and through us for the glory of God and the benefit of our neighbor. Weekly. Daily. Faithfully.




