From the Pastor's Pen

In light of the events throughout our nation, not only over the past few weeks and months, but even longer (I think of those legislators who were ambushed at the front doors of their homes, the senseless violence committed at schools and other places of public gathering), I pass on the following. It comes from a newsletter I subscribe to: Lutherans for Life.org

A Few Thoughts on the Recent Violence by Rev. Dr. Aric Fenske

There has been much written over the past several weeks in the wake of the recent violent acts that have taken place across our country: another school shooting, an innocent woman stabbed on a subway, the assassination of a popular speaker. I have no desire to rehash those events, nor do I intend this to be a response to any event or any article in particular. I simply want to share a few reminders from God's Word that can help us process these things in a proper and godly manner. First, we must remember that every human being has been created by God and is therefore precious to Him. That is true regardless of their political associations or even whether or not they have faith in Him. God's final words to Jonah illustrate this beautifully. The people of Ninevah were enemies of Israel, and yet the book of Jonah closes with God asking, "And should not I pity Nineveh, that great city, in which there are more than 120,000 persons who do not know their right hand from their left, and also much cattle?" (Jonah 4:11).

Instead of wishing for the destruction of His enemies, God pitied them and hoped for their repentance.

He says exactly the same thing to the prophet Ezekiel. "As I live, declares the Lord God, I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked, but that the wicked turn from his way and live" (Ezekiel 33:11).

God takes no delight in the death of any man, even the wicked and those who've turned away from Him. Instead, He longs for their repentance to the point that He takes on our sinful human flesh and bears the sins of the world so that all can "be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth" (1 Timothy 2:4).

Since we have been redeemed by His blood and brought to faith in Christ, we have the Spirit of Christ dwelling in us (Romans 8:9) and are to "have the mind of Christ" (1 Corinthians 2:16). That is to say, we have been redeemed from sin that we might begin to think about our neighbors the way that Christ thinks about them.

That means, for starters, that we mourn every act of violence and every death. Jesus does not revel in the death of any person, even His enemies, and neither should we. This is especially true if they

are outside the Body of Christ. Knowing that those who die outside of Christ must face eternal condemnation, we should weep over every life that ends without repentance and faith.

We must also remember that violence and murder are tools of the devil (John 8:44) and are wicked intrusions into God's creation. Death is the result of—not the solution to—sin. We cannot use death to solve the problems and divisions that exist between us sinners. Instead, death should always be viewed as the result of sin (Romans 6:23) and therefore as our enemy (1 Corinthians 15:26). Hoping for or demanding the death of any person because of their nationality, religion, sexual orientation, or political views has no place among the Body of Christ.

Instead, our Lord Jesus teaches us that we are to love our enemies and pray for those who persecute us (Matthew 5:44). We pray for their repentance, even as we acknowledge our own sinfulness and pray for our own repentance so that we might act and speak with humility and work toward building unity and peace among all people (Ephesians 4:2-3).

In like manner, we should pray for the perpetrators of such violent and sinful acts. Any person who would commit such evil has clearly been enslaved by sin and has a mind that is corrupted and defiled by the devil, and therefore is in need of repentance and salvation. Pray that the Holy Spirit works the miracle of conversion in them before it is too late, even as we pray that justice be done for the preservation of civil order (1 Timothy 2:1-2; 1 Peter 2:14).

Additionally, since St. Paul encourages us to "weep with those who weep" (Romans 12:15), we should weep with the families of those affected by these acts of violence and pray for them. Pray that God takes care of their bodily needs and that He would bring them the comfort and peace that can only come from the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and that through these tragedies, they and all others would be drawn closer to God in faith.

Finally, we remember that in the face of such darkness, Christ shines as the Light of the world (John 9:5). Amazingly, He shines His light through us as we preach the Gospel and imitate His love before the world (Matthew 5:14-16). So, we will follow the example of those who went before us and preach the Gospel to a world broken by sin, knowing that the Gospel alone has the power to change hearts. And all the while, we pray that God brings an end to violence and bloodshed and ushers in the day when sin is completely removed from us and all tears will be wiped from our eyes.




Our annual Advent Fellowship Brunch, "The Advent of Our King"

Harmonious Stewardship

"For as in one body we have many members, and the members do not all have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another" (Romans 12:4-5).

One of the most forgotten concepts in stewardship is the interdependent nature that makes up the Body of Christ and the way that body supports the shared work of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This is experienced in the local congregation, as well as in broader mission and ministry efforts at the district and Synod levels. Yet in these words, St. Paul reminds the Romans and us that we are indeed members of one another. This is true in our worship. It is also true in our stewardship of the Gospel. Stewards of all shapes and sizes, ages and abilities, affluence and influence are all assembled around Word and Sacrament in the local congregation with no one being more important than the other.

Part of this forgetting lies in what the eyes see and how our human mind operates. Our eyes and our minds are quick to come to the erroneous conclusion that the person who writes the biggest check is the more important steward. Human logic, flawed by sin as it is, could make a claim that the youngest child or the most infirm, aged member of the congregation would certainly be considered something less than important when it comes to the stewardship of the Gospel.

Paul makes it clear in these words that this is not how stewardship of the Gospel is measured in the Body of Christ. Rather, it would be better to view local stewardship like the lost art of harmony in congregational singing. This has been lost not only due to the performative nature of the lead singers of the local praise team, but also because modern hymnals are written to almost force the novice hymn-singer into unison voice. Creative harmonization by talented organists is beautiful to listen to, but does not always support the people in the pews in singing in parts. This is a loss in demonstrating a very practical aspect of whole-body stewardship.

The sound that builds when choral and congregational singers settle into their voice parts is nothing short of heavenly! Yet when altos, tenors and bass sing their individual parts without any concept of how they fit together, the music doesn't sound as powerful. The narrow range of the typical alto line almost sounds monotonous. The tenor line can get painfully high, and the base

line can get uncomfortably low. But, when interdependently entwined, along with the melody that is so often carried by the sopranos, the music becomes a tremendously powerful tool in communicating the Gospel.

The same is true of individual stewards. Certainly, stewards with more financial means are in a unique place to "carry the tune" for ministry in a local congregation. But that doesn't rule out the faithful stewardship of the saint-like 94-year-old Hulda, who prayed for her young pastor in German every night while the aches and pains of arthritis and the grief of losing a daughter to cancer kept her awake. This does not rule out Jimmy, the profoundly developmentally disabled confirmand whose basic but dramatically eloquent confession of the faith left an impression on a congregation long after he went to be with Jesus. It doesn't rule out the single parent, the recovering addict, the family coming out of bankruptcy, the elderly widow and everyone in between.

The Lord has entrusted all the baptized with stewardship of the one thing needful: the Gospel of Jesus Christ. No one member of any congregation is more important than another when it comes to this stewardship. The biggest check isn't always the best way to communicate the Gospel. In fact, it is almost always better communicated with the widow's mite, the tenacious stewardship of the talents and so much more.

In the local congregation and beyond, our corporate stewardship of the Gospel needs each other to fill out our great confession. It is not about equal amount. It is about interdependence that only the Holy Spirit can work! Each of us has a role to play, a harmony to sing. The standard for that role is faithfulness. We do not have the same function, but we have the same Jesus! As we sing the parts entrusted to us by the Holy Spirit, the sweet music of the Gospel goes out!
