

# From the Pastor's Pen

As we close out November and move into December, we begin another new church year. This coming Sunday, December 3<sup>rd</sup> is the First Sunday in Advent. Now Advent is not the beginning of Christmas. Christmas begins on The Nativity of Our Lord, December 24<sup>th</sup> and concludes twelve days later (hence "The Twelve Days of Christmas") on January 6<sup>th</sup>, which is Epiphany. The church marches to a different drumbeat than the world.

Advent, (from Latin *adventus*, "coming"), is the period of preparation for the celebration of the birth of Jesus at Christmas and also of preparation for his Second Coming. Seems kind of odd doesn't it, that in one season of the church year we celebrate Christ's first and second comings? Didn't we just listen to texts about Jesus' second coming? Yes, we did. And we'll hear more! Why? Because the two "comings" go together. You can't have a second coming if there wasn't a first. And to talk about a first coming makes no sense unless there is another. Confused? I'll make it simple. It's all about Jesus.

While we, as Christians, know that it's all about Jesus, it is hard to keep that focus while the world around us makes this time of the year all about shopping, catchy jingles, and festivities. Black Friday sales (that started way before Black Friday, and will continue long after), parties, and community activities galore vie for our time, and our money. With all that increased "hubbub" how can we strive to keep the focus on Jesus? Well, how about making some more time for Him? If you haven't been to church in a while, how about using this Advent season for getting back into the habit? Redeemer has several opportunities this Advent for you to reengage. There is a schedule of the upcoming Advent Mid-week services as well as the Christmas Eve Candlelight and Carols service listed elsewhere in The Saltshaker.

May we keep our eyes, hearts, and minds fixed and focused upon Jesus this Advent and Christmas season. After all, if it weren't for his Incarnation, his life, death, resurrection, and ascension there would be no Christmas season. It's not about shopping, giving and/or getting gifts; not about feel-good jingle tunes, parties, and festivities as fun as all that is. It's about Jesus. Jesus for you.

### The Measure of Our Generosity

If you open up the Small Catechism, you'll find a shortened version of the Third Commandment: "Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy." But if you look up the list of the Ten Commandments in Exodus, you'll find the full version:

Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor, and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, you, or your son, or your daughter, your male servant, or your female servant, or your livestock, or the sojourner who is within your gates. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested on the seventh day. Therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy. (Ex. 20:8–11)

Why did Luther shorten this commandment for the Small Catechism? Was it so that the kids wouldn't have so much to memorize? No, it was because Luther knew that all the details of the Third Commandment were part of the "shadow" of the Old Testament (Col. 2:16). Or as St. Paul puts it, there is "letter" in the Old Testament law and "spirit" (2 Cor. 3:6). The details of not working on Saturday were fulfilled by Christ. That part of the Sabbath regulation no longer applies. But the spirit of the law does remain: We need to dedicate sufficient time each week to hearing God's Word and giving it honor and respect. Or as Luther sums it up in the Small Catechism's explanation to the Third Commandment: "We should fear and love God so that we do not despise preaching and His Word but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it."

The same sort of analysis applies to our giving. In the Old Testament, God commanded the Israelites to give a tenth of their income to the Levites so that those men could dedicate their lives to serving in God's house, teaching the people, conducting worship, etc. In the New Testament, there is a rigid requirement listed about handing in your tax forms to church to make sure you've given enough. But the mandate to have a full-time ministry, which is the spirit of that law concerning tithing to the Levites, is right there in 1 Corinthians 9:14: "The Lord has ordained that those who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel."

The New Testament church's job is significantly larger than the job of Old Testament Israel. We are commanded to preach the Gospel to all nations. There was only the temple to maintain in the Old Testament, but we have churches, schools, universities and seminaries, plus missionaries everywhere. So you tell me: Can we really undertake the work of the ministry if our giving doesn't even measure up to Old Testament levels of generosity?



### **Mite Explanation**

Based on the Biblical account of the widow's mite (Luke 21:1–4), the Mite Box is intended for regular contributions of "mites" — offerings above and beyond the support given to congregations and the LCMS. Mite Box contributions amount to millions of dollars that fund district and national mission grants and implement the LWML program.

### The Widow's Mite

Jesus sat down opposite the place where the offerings were put and watched the crowd putting their money into the temple treasury. Many rich people threw in large amounts. But a poor widow came and put in two very small copper coins, worth only a fraction of a penny. Calling his disciples to him, Jesus said, "I tell you the truth, this poor widow has put more into the treasury than all the others. They all gave out of their wealth, but she, out of her poverty, put in everything — all she had to live on".

#### **LWML Grants**

### <u>Christ-Centered Materials for Hmong Language School and Outreach</u> St. Paul Hmong Outreach Ministries — \$70,208

St. Paul Hmong Outreach Ministries in Merced, California, has been actively involved in outreach to Hmong communities in their native tongue for 15 years. In 2015 and 2018, Hmong language schools were founded. They are connected with host churches, St. Paul Lutheran in Merced and Redeemer Lutheran in Fresno, California. Through the schools and outreach at New Year's festivals, the Gospel is being heard and families are being baptized and confirmed. Funds will be used to continue mission programs, develop new training modules, and support training implementation of Christ-centered educational materials in the Hmong language to be used in the schools, for festival outreach, and to share with other LCMS churches and districts.

The Hmong people came to the United States as refugees following the Vietnam war. After living in the US for over forty years, the children and young adults are losing Hmong language skills which are important to their elders. The Hmong Language School teaches language skills using Hmong

### November 14, 2023

Redeemer Lutheran Church Council Briefs

Pastor Rex Watt opened with prayer.

Devotional by Pastor Rex Watt from Thessalonians 1:5.

October council meeting minutes reviewed and accepted.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Council approved the treasurers report for October 2023. Council also approved the 2024 church budget that the budget committee passed earlier this month. The 2024 budget will be presented to the congregation at a voters meeting on December 10<sup>th</sup>. A discussion was held regarding the endowment fund and possible diversification due to a continued downward trend in the fund's market performance. Council decided to put this discussion on hold until next month.

The bathroom remodel is underway and council approved that the bathroom remodel manager report monthly to the property chairmen on the progress of the project. The purpose of this is to reduce scope creep and be good stewards of the project funds

<u>Pastor's Report</u>: October was relatively routine with the addition of a memorial service, 2 confirmations, and welcoming 6 new members. Advent midweek services will be held at 1pm and 7pm on December 6th, 13th, and 20<sup>th</sup>. Soup supper will be held these same evenings at 6pm.

<u>Elder's Report</u>: Two new youth acolytes have been trained and are serving the church, Alton and Matilda. Ian McLeod is training and supervising their progress.

Christmas Eve morning will be a normal Sunday morning service including communion. The Christmas Eve Candlelight service will be at 7:00pm consisting of carols and readings but not include communion. No service for Monday, Christmas Day. New Year's Eve service which falls on a Sunday will be a normal church service including communion.

Elders have approved for Pastor Wildermuth to continue preaching once a month at Redeemer. Pastor Watt and Pastor Wildermuth will create an appropriate schedule for him. Budgetarily, this service work has already been accounted for.

<u>Property Report</u>: A thermostat for one of the children's rooms was replaced. We are purchasing a Blink video doorbell unit to improve the safety security of the front door area. Church staff will have the ability see who is requesting entry before coming out to the front door. The children's septic tank was repaired underbudget by Baker Septic.

Education Report: Sunday School Christmas Program is progressing and will be performed during the Christmas Eve church service. Preschool assistants have been leading the preschool as the head teacher is on leave of absence to attend to her son's recovery from surgery. Sunday school will be starting the children's edition of Luther's Small Catechism in January. The Board of Ed. Will meet in January to discuss the possibility of VBS in the summer of 2024.

<u>Evangelism Report</u>: Focus on the Family magazines came in for October and soon will arrive for November. This information is distributed in church mailboxes and by postal mail.
