Happy Fourth of July! On this day we celebrate the ratification of the Declaration of Independence by the Second Continental Congress, which declared the 13 Colonies to be free and independent states. It is considered to be the birthday of the U.S.A. And like all birthdays, it is celebrated with fun activities, such as: fireworks, parades, barbeques, family gatherings, and other celebrative events. Fundamental to Fourth of July celebrations is the idea of freedom. As Americans, we value freedom! And I hope we never devalue that fundamental idea.

Yet, as Americans, we as a nation, have not always lived up to that concept as well as we might have liked. As I write this, we just passed Juneteenth, the celebration of the emancipation of enslaved African Americans. Argue what you will about that chapter of American history, one that included a Civil War over the issue, but one still needs to figure out how that squared with, "*We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.*"


I hope as American citizens we will look at our glass from the "half-full" perspective and not on the "half-empty". I hope that we *all* can emphasize the good and great qualities of our past and not focus only on the ugly baggage. One cannot deny that checkered past, but let us not live in that checkered past. That is "half-empty" glass living.

That's not how we as Christians live. At least it shouldn't be. We shouldn't be living our lives focused on our checkered past. God has forgiven that past in the waters of our Baptism. We have been made new creatures by our new birthday (2 Cor 5:17). We have been emancipated from a slavery far worse than any worldly political/social entity could ever impose upon us: slavery to sin. This doesn't mean that we ignore, or try to deny that checkered past... but it does mean that we don't live in it. For we have been born anew "to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead" (1 Pet 1:3). That living hope has given us perfect freedom in Christ. Freedom to praise him, love him, and trust him in all things. Freedom to love others over ourselves. Freedom to focus on the rights, and more importantly, the needs of our neighbors.

As you celebrate our nation's birthday, let us never forget what it cost to have that freedom. Also let us never forget what it cost God to give us the ultimate freedom. Jesus has set you free. Live in that freedom.

Go ... Sell All You Have?

"What must I do to inherit eternal life?" asked the rich young ruler. Jesus said, "You know the commandments." And he replied, "All these I have kept from my youth." And Jesus said to him, "One thing you still lack. Sell all that you have and distribute to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me" (Luke 18:18–22).

When we hear this story, this question comes to mind: is Jesus speaking to us also, or only to the rich young ruler? In other words, is Jesus telling us to sell all that we have and give it to the poor?

As good Lutherans, we answer, "No!" But why? Why should we not sell all that we have and distribute it to the poor? The simplest explanation is this: if we sold everything we have, our wife and our children would be neglected. In other words, to sell everything we have and give it to the poor would ignore, even abandon, those whom God has placed in our care. Our money, every-thing we have, is not to be used solely for the church. But that doesn't excuse us from using our money for the purpose God intends.

Everyone has three stations in life, three spheres in which we live and are to be of service to our neighbors. These stations are the church, the family and society. We are members of all three of these by birth. We are born into the church by water and the Word of God, and our duties to oth-ers in the church arise from our Baptism into the church. We are born into a family, and our duties to others stem from our birth into that family. Finally, we are born into society, which is simply a further extension of our birth into our family. The duties we have toward other mem-bers of society come from either our own birth or the birth of others into the same society.

All that we have and all that we are ought to be pressed into service for the church, the family and society. If we were to sell all we have and give only to one, the other two would be neglected, and we would falter in fulfilling our duties.

So, consider your life and all that you have in light of these three stations. You pay taxes to sup-port and help those in society. You save for college for your children, and provide food, clothing and shelter for the members of your family.

But the station that is usually thought of last is the church. Since the needs of the family and so-ciety are more immediate, the church is often given what is left over. This is not how it should be. Rather, we are to give of our first fruits, from off the top, the best, even as Abel gave the best of his flock.

This requires forethought. It means that you sit down and make a plan of what you will give from the beginning. It means sticking to it even when it seems that there are other more immediate and pressing things.

And this is all the more necessary now as we enter into periods of time where giving is low due to high unemployment or where restrictions on meeting in church limit opportunities to give. If we love God and His gifts of forgiveness given through the means of grace, which we receive at church and only at church, then we will support it, just as we love our country and our family. For all that we have and all that we are is given to us by our gracious God. He spared no expense for us and our salvation. He gave up His Son to death so that our sins are forgiven, and we will live. What's more, He provides for all that we need for this body and life. And our lives in this world, among these three spheres of church, family and society are to mirror the generosity of the one who gave us life in all three at birth.

Don't let the church, your divine family, be an afterthought or even ignored. It is nurturing you, bringing you up in salvation through Word and Sacrament.



Redeemer Lutheran Church Council Briefs June 13, 2023

Meeting was called to order at 6:35 p.m.

Pastor opened in prayer.

Pastor presented a devotional from Exodus 3 verses 9 and 10.

May council meeting minutes were amended for corrections and approved.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: The church year to date shows a deficit of -\$11,849.26. The deficit is a decrease in Tithes and offerings. Council voted to cancel QuickBooks payroll and hire the services of PAYCHEX for the monthly payroll. The cost will be \$281.08 over the cost of QuickBooks. PAYCHEX will also be doing all of the IRS documents in addition to payroll.

<u>Pastor's Report</u>: Pastor taught 4 Sunday morning Adult Bible classes and 2 confirmation classes (1 was cancelled due to Mother's Day, and one other due to absences). Pastor had one hospital call, 1 shut in, 3 phone consultations and 3 pre-marriage counseling sessions. SMP training has started with the last course in the program. Adult information classes on June 7, 14 and 21, and leave for St. Louis June 22nd, back on June 30th. Attended Pastor's conference May 1-3, Church was open for National Day of Prayer and was appreciated by those that came. Planning once a month meeting with young adults. Pastor Wildermuth will cover June 25th, and July 2nd

<u>Elder's Report</u>: Rod reported: One church member is willing to serve on the Elder board if needed, two other members have not been contracted yet to serve but are on the list of eligible members. Heidi Kuljis has accepted the stewardship nomination as was appointed. The next Elder meeting will be July 10, due to the 4th of July holiday.

<u>Property Report</u>: The exterior door lights have been changed out, and the photocell entrance lights are updated.

<u>Education Report</u>: There were only a couple of folks to volunteer for VBS, to do a July VBS is past the deadline now, and perhaps next year only do a one day VBS.

<u>Evangelism report</u>: There are now 10 subscriptions for "Focus on the Family" and those will be passed out to the young families.

<u>Unfinished Business</u>: Mount Baker Lawn care service was at the church trimming trees. Mount Baker is still doing a month to month basis. The lawn bill might be higher this month due to this.

<u>New Business</u>: There was discussion regarding the church is currently working with a 43 year old constitution and bylaws, and would be wise for the council to review and update where needed. The possibility of a council leadership retreat was briefly discussed to strengthen and inspire council members.

This would be wonderful but it would depend on parents being committed to bringing their children to class. We would love to have an old fashion Sunday school opening and could provide classes for different age groups if we had enough teachers/volunteers.

We will provide all materials needed: lessons, books and craft items but need to have a list of teachers before we can move forward with Sunday school classes.
