

I reported in last month's newsletter that the LWML national goals to fund all grants were met, with either total funding for some grants or more than 50% of a number of grant requests funded. Now I am bringing you up to date on our WA-Alaska Region grant requests of \$75,000. Our district has collected \$14,000. So we are behind. We can fix that! There are new mite boxes available to you on the table beneath the LWML bulletin board in the area by the dining tables. Also, if you wish to donate bills, the larger collection box on the table will accommodate those along with coins.

We heard a brief mission report on an international grant request. The Lutheran Theological Seminary in Novosibirsk and Parish of St. Andrew are fully operating. Education and training continue to further establish connections in this region. The seminary has a first-class faculty and as a confessional Lutheran seminary, standards are high. Some faculty members have received their theological education in part at Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, Ind. Each year seminary professors host seminars for adults throughout Russia and neighboring countries like Ukraine. Our mites support a mighty need and purpose in a war-torn region where knowledge of Jesus Christ and Scripture's message of truth and hope are being declared.

The LWML will hold its 40th Biennial LWML Convention on June 22-25, 2023 in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. We have a young woman, Erin Black, who is active in our Redeemer congregation in attendance and as a choir member. Erin has also been very active for several years in the Lutheran Women Missionary League. She attended the Biennial Convention in Lexington, KY in 2021. She also attended our District Convention in Wenatchee, as well as our zone meetings. She served as the District convention committee chair for Young Women.

Alaska-WA District president, Carolyn Holbrook shared that Erin has served her two-year responsibilities and presented an excellent program to the whole audience at the District Convention in Wenatchee last summer. Redeemer Lutheran Church Council Briefs March 14, 2023

Meeting was called to order at 6:45 p.m.

Pastor opened in prayer.

Pastor presented a devotional from John 4 verses 6 and 7.

January Council Minutes were reviewed and accepted. (February meeting cancelled due to illnesses.)

Treasurer's Report: The January and February treasurer's reports were reviewed and accepted. The council discussed the complexity of our church's accounting system and approved a simplification process that will be less time consuming to manage. Council also discussed and approved for Carl to participate in a QuickBooks training to learn how to build reports and modify existing reports more in line with our church's needs.

<u>**Pastor's Report :**</u> Confirmation classes continue. Pastoral care included one family, 2 phone counseling sessions, one office counseling session and one private confession/absolution meeting. He started class #15 out of 16 for SMP training. The average attendance in January was 60 and February 53. Lenten services are going well.

Elder's Report: Nominations for council positions are coming up to vote on in May voters meeting. There will be one usher instead of two for Sunday service. The Elders will be doing an omelet bar for Mother's Day.

<u>Stewardship Report</u>: An Easter breakfast board will be up by this Sunday. Folks have been asking for more fellowship activities perhaps once a month like crafting, cooking, movies, games, cleaning and tidying up areas in the church.

<u>Property Report</u>: The current lawn service has increased their service by about \$250 a month. The option of buying a zero turn lawnmower and have congregants mow is being considered. Three other contractors are also being contacted for bids.

Education Report: Carol reported Sunday school is going well. There was discussion regarding announcing when it is time for the children to head out to Sunday school. It is in the bulletin and on the overhead, on the next Sunday the reader will make an announcement before the readings begin. Council decided to have the reader for Sunday service "excuse" the children from the sanctuary to let them know

Evangelism report: Ross discussed publications regarding political issues affecting religious freedom and negatively affecting the unity of our country. These topics are important for evangelists to know so they can have a knowledgeable interaction with anyone they encounter. Evangelism meetings are Thursdays 1:30 and 7:00.

<u>Unfinished Business</u>: Council approved continuing with Creed Technologies for another annual contract for church computer security. Council approved bringing a revised church vision statement to voters meeting for discussion and a vote.

<u>New Business</u>: Council discussed and decided to decline applying for ERC Tax Credit for employee retention as our church was not negatively affected financially by the pandemic.

David Stamps is retired from a 40 year career in journalism. He is a Vietnam combat Veteran and we thank him for his service!



A Better Way

The most common question about stewardship is not whether a Christian should give to their church. Of course Christians should give to their church. Everyone knows this. Rather, the question asked most is, "How much should I give?" But this question really means, "Should Christians give a tenth of their income to their local congregation?"

Here are some common reasons against tithing. Some say tithing isn't necessary because it isn't expressly commanded in the New Testament. There is no "Thus saith the Lord," or "should" concerning tithing. Others say that Christians give to their congregation in ways much broader than money. They give of their time and their talents, and these together with treasures (money) add up to more than a tithe. Still others say that they give of their treasures to other things be-sides their congregation, and they want to support those things alongside their church. And then there are those who think Christians shouldn't tithe because of some fear. They are afraid that if they tithe, their gift will be misused, or that after tithing, there won't be enough left over to get the things that they use, want or need.

Here are some reasons why Christians should tithe. Even though the New Testament doesn't specifically command Christians to tithe, the Old Testament people were commanded to. And on top of this, St. Paul often describes giving a regular and generous proportion of the first fruits of one's income — terms similar to a tithe (2 Cor. 8:7–23; 2 Cor. 9:2–7).

But here's another way to think about it. What was the point of the tithe in the Old Testament? Where did it go? This tithe was intended to support the ministry of the Levites. They were not given any land because they had no time to farm; their full-time job was the ministry. What does it say in the New Testament? "The Lord commanded that those who proclaim the gospel should get their living by the gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14). This is the verse that Luther used in the Small Cate-chism's Table of Duties to explain what Christians owe to the support of the ministry.

It seems clear from both the Old and the New Testaments that the tithe is the goal of Christians in their giving. But what if we're not there yet? How should we handle this? What are we to do?

Let's answer this by asking a different question. What would you say to your adult children who only attended church quarterly or once a month? After all, there is no passage in the New Testa-ment that requires Christians to go to church weekly. Hebrews 10:25 is the closest verse we have, and it states simply that Christians should not neglect gathering together. And even though there is no passage that commands Christians to gather weekly, that is the implicit expectation throughout the Old and New Testaments. So, what would you say to that son or daughter? The conversation might go something like this. I'm glad you're still going to church. It is a wonderful blessing to hear God's promises of for-

giveness, life and salvation, and to receive His gifts in Word and Sacrament. But you can do bet-ter, and it will only be a blessing to you. There is a better way, and I'd really like you to try to attain it.

We should approach the topic of tithing with a similar conversation. The tithe is not specifically commanded in the New Testament, but it sure seems like the implicit expectation of both the Old and New Testaments. So, we're ecstatic that you're giving, and that you're giving in all these various ways — time, talents and treasures. But there is a better way. And that will only be a blessing to you, just as the Word of God — Old and New Testament alike — promises. Can you try increasing your gifts over the coming weeks, months and years? Can you put your trust in the God who sent His Son to take away your sin and give you everlasting life? And if He did this for you, if He did not spare His only Son, how will He not give you all things? He will not disap-point.
